"Realism, Strategic Interest, and Moral Responsibility Regarding Iran" John D. Steinbruner | September 2012

Several factors underlie ongoing negotiations over Iran's nuclear program, argues Steinbruner: Iran cannot be coerced into accepting inequitable restrictions on



uranium enrichment activities, but neither can it resist restrictions that are equitable. Whichever party in the negotiations establishes the more credible adherence to legal norms will win the critical battle for global support.

"Micro-Level Analysis of Civil Violence: An Event Data Analysis of Kenya, Georgia-Russia, and Mexico" Kevin Jones | August 2012

Jones presents a conceptual framework for analyzing the heterogeneous and dynamic character of local conflict. This work is anchored in the need to describe conflict dynamics as they occur, to understand in real-time the political, economic, and social drivers, and to gather high-resolution (e.g. local, disaggregated) data to analyze social instability. The paper demonstrates the effectiveness of such a framework and applies it to three case studies.

By examining public opinion data, Afzal shows that in Pakistan the relationship between education and support for terrorism varies by gender. Among her findings are that uneducated women are more likely to support militancy relative to uneducated men, controlling for religiosity, demographics, region, and terrorist events in the district.
