

## CISSM researchers identify patterns in international cybersecurity information sharing agreements

Information sharing is the most commonly promoted type of international cybersecurity cooperation, but very little is known about what type of information is currently being shared with whom, for what purposes, and under what conditions.

As a first step towards answering these questions, CISSM researchers <u>Theresa Hitchens</u> and <u>Nilsu Goren</u> undertook to survey, catalog, and analyze publicly available government-to-government cybersecurityrelated sharing agreements to determine what types of information various governments have committed to share, and to identify gaps in information sharing.

#### This research, published as <u>"International</u> <u>Cybersecurity Information Sharing Agreements,"</u> found that such agreements are more numerous, but less specific than commonly thought. And, despite the potential benefits of sharing more cyber-security information, many disincentives and logistical barriers remain.

## CISSM researchers analyze how to improve the proliferation resistance of global nuclear energy system

As part of a broader effort to understand the likely proliferation implications of a global expansion of nuclear power capacities, CISSM researchers conducted an expert eliciation to assess how the deployment of small modular reactors (SMRs) and adoption of novel fuel-cycle arrangements could affect the proliferation resistance of the global nuclear energy system. The <u>study's findings</u>, published in the *Journal of Risk Analysis*, emphasize the significant impact of institutional arrangements on proliferation resistance, including multinational fuel-cycle arrangements and the safeguardability of reactors and other nuclear facilities.



### Latest CISSM polls of Iranian public attitudes find increased support for JCPOA

A July 2017 CISSM study of Iranian public opinion,, <u>"The Ramifications of Rouhani's Re-election,"</u> finds that 8 in 10 Iranians agree that Iranian President Hassan Rouhani's re-election means most Iranians approve of his foreign policy and the nuclear deal he negotiated with the P5+1 countries. Less than a quarter (24 %) said it signified that most Iranians disapprove of the ideals of the Islamic revolution.

#### VIEW ALL CISSM STUDIES OF IRANIAN PUBLIC OPINION

After a decline in Iranian enthusiasm about the JCPOA—from 75 percent soon after it was signed to 55 percent after President Trump's election—support rose to 67 percent during the election

process. In presidential TV debates, all candidates supported the deal but argued about who could get Iran more of the promised benefits.

#### CISSM launches blog on U.S.-Russian security relations

As part of its project on <u>U.S.-Russian Security</u> <u>Relations</u>, CISSM launched a new blog, <u>"The Bear</u> <u>and the Eagle,"</u> to provide a regular commentary on multiple aspects of U.S.-Russian relations. In introducing the blog, CISSM Director <u>Nancy</u> <u>Gallagher explained</u>, "Our hope is that this space can serve as a platform for current and former researchers and students at CISSM and ISKRAN, as well as others who care about U.S.-Russia security cooperation, to share ideas about how relations might be lifted out of a deep ditch and put back on an upward path again. We plan to feature



new opinion pieces and commentary on current events, as well as previously published work that remains relevant today."

#### Sankaran article nominated for Brodie Prize

Research published by CISSM Research Associate Jaganath Sankaran was <u>named a finalist for the 2018</u> <u>Brodie Prize</u>. Sankaran's <u>research</u>, published in the journal *Contemporary Security Policy*, evaluated the capabilities of missile defense installations in South Korea and the need for the South Korean government to reassure China of its intentions regarding its missile defense cooperation with the United States. Sankaran's work was one of five articles listed as a finalist for the prize.
